How to get moving with **Exercise at Your Desk**:

- Introduce **Exercise at Your Desk** to employees at employee meetings, via e-mail announcements or through Webinars.
- Provide a demonstration of the exercises and help employees learn how to do them correctly as shown on the poster or presentation slides.
- Educate employees about good ergonomics and teach them how to set up a functional workstation.
- Encourage employees to hang their **Exercise at Your Desk** logs in easy view and use them to track exercise sessions.
- Consider holding a contest to engage employees in the program, or give incentives.
- Hold a “victory party” once participants have completed the program. And when the party’s over, employees can keep celebrating their success by practicing good ergonomics—and by feeling more fit and flexible every day.
